### APPROACH


Students look critically at their own trash behavior and how this affects their communities as well as global waste problems.

Students are encouraged to 'think globally and act locally' to help reduce litter and increase recycling in their communities.

On each side of the ocean, students make video introductions for the students in the other city to learn about each other.






Students share information about who they are, where they are from, and what their schools and neighborhoods are like.

Plastic bags & plastic soup


Trash and nature; how animals suffer

### **OPERATION TRASH EXCHANGE**

### GOALS

- Teach the concepts of Reduce, Reuse & Recycle
- Inspire participants to help find environmentally friendly solutions for trash pollution locally and worldwide
- Inspire them to become ambassadors for cleaner neighborhoods with increased recycling
- Support community cleanups led by participants
- Compare & contrast trash behavior with kids from another culture

### HISTORY

2017 is the first year of the Operation Trash Baltimore-Rotterdam Educational Exchange.

It leverages existing **Operatie Afval** course materials designed and taught by Avalanche Arts / Stichting Lawine in Rotterdam schools and communities for many years.

This exchange builds on a pilot exchange in 2015 with Baltimore's Masonville Cove Environmental Education Center and IKC 't Palet Holy, an elementary school near Rotterdam.

It also follows environmentallythemed art educational projects with children and community residents in the Baybrook area of Baltimore and Heijplaat area of Rotterdam, entitled HarborTraces (2012-2013).

## FOCUS ON OUR YOUTH, TO INVEST IN OUR FUTURE

Avalanche Arts designed the Operation Trash program to teach the next generation at an early age how to deal with trash.

If we instill good trash behavior into our young citizens, they grow up with this knowledge and won't develop bad habits to be unlearned later. It is difficult to alter the "shop 'til you drop" mentality with older teenagers and adults. By increasing awareness of the consequences of our extravagant consumption lifestyle at an early age, children learn to think before they buy, and think before they trash.

# OPERATIE AFVAL IN ROTTERDAM

Rotterdam is a city full of neighborhoods that face many challenges – including the need for cleaner and safer neighborhoods.

Operatie Afval program (for middle and high schools) and Spelen in een Schonere Wijk (for elementary schools) starts by having children and teenagers look

critically at their own trash behavior. Then the students work actively on ways to help keep their neighborhood clean and design methods to increase recycling.

The program teaches good trash behavior by combining creative arts and games designed to teach healthy group dynamics. Over the years Avalanche Arts has visited many schools in Rotterdam, most of which are located in Rotterdam-Zuid. This 'learning through laughter' approach has booked good results in building trash management awareness in Rotterdam youth.

### OPERATIE AFVAL IN ROTTERDAM

Stichting Lawine won the Leaders for a Living Planet Award from World Wide Fund for Nature (WWF) for its educational projects about trash. The award was presented at Rotterdam city hall during the 50<sup>th</sup> anniversary of WWF.

WWF is also known as World Wildlife Fund.
